Big Bend Bike Rally & Hahn Brothers' Shootout Pair-up Again on September 20-21

For six consecutive years, the Great Bend Expo Complex has been a destination for hundreds of motorcycle riders looking for a place to kick back and cut loose. The Big Bend Bike Rally puts Great Bend on the map for motorcycle enthusiasts across the country who are looking for live music, thrilling entertainment and a family friendly atmosphere. And again in 2014, the growing annual event will continue to build with the 2nd Annual Hahn Brothers' Supercross Shootout.

Building on last year's record breaking attendance, the Hahn Brothers' Shootout will be hosted by nationally famous professional motocross racers Wil & Tommy Hahn. This one of a kind race features both amateur and pro racing and provides entertainment for spectators as well.

The motocross race continues to be the only one like it that is hosted by world renown professional riders. Wil & Tommy Hahn grew up racing in and around Great Bend, and consider this to be their home track. While Wil has been out with a shoulder injury this summer, the older of the brothers, Tommy Hahn, has made a come-back debut with several notable finishes in the outdoor track series.

"We remember racing at the Great Bend track, and we might've had mullets sticking out of our helmets," Wil Hahn says. "My brother and I are excited about giving back to this community by putting our name on this inaugural race and pulling in all our professional racing buddies to draw a huge crowd."

Efforts in 2013 by an impressive event committee established the track and a foundation for future racing. The City of Great Bend has partnered with a local group who is operating the track on a year-round basis which will continue to encourage the popularity and momentum of the sport at the local level.

While the motocross race will have a huge draw all on its own, it doesn't hurt that the biggest motorcycle rally in the region will be happening on the same day at the same facility. The 7th Annual Big Bend Bike Rally is anticipated to draw over 2,000 riders from all over

the Midwest. The 7th Annual event will feature entertainment by the Flaunt Girls sponsored by The Handlebar & Grill, a Globe of Death stunt show and live music provided by Homebrew. The event schedule is available online and includes details on a benefit ride, vendors, beer garden and more. Free camping also makes it worth the drive for lots of bikers, which is sponsored by Harper Camperland of Great Bend. Great Bend, Kan

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"Our rally is unique because of the jam packed schedule. Longtime favorite items like the parade ride and bike games will be back again in 2014 but we're really excited about some new additions which include a bike show and nationally recognized entertainment like the Flaunt Girls" says Rick Love, 2014 Event Chair. "Over the past six years the committee has worked to figure out what the crowd wants, and this year should be a crowd pleaser."

A special meet-and-greet event has been scheduled for Thursday, September 18th from 4-6 p.m. at Jack Kilby Square in Great Bend. Community residents and motocross fans can meet the profes-



sional racers who are putting their name behind the Great Bend event, and get exclusive photograph and autograph opportunities. The meet-and-greet is free to attend, and is open to the public, this event is sponsored by Bass-X Autosound & Accessories.

For weekend admission, spectators pay just \$10 per person to see both of these huge attractions, and kids under twelve are half price. Gates open at 7 a.m. on Saturday, September 20th and entertainment doesn't stop until mid-

GBFE President Les Hopkins could talk quality machinery and agriculture all day but when it comes to explaining the company's success, he credits his employees. "My service shop is what makes this business," Hopkins said. "They believe in what they are doing and know how to do it. I guess this is true in any business. Service is it. That is what it all comes down to and that is what we try to do here – give good, honest service at a fair price.



A Business Built on Service for Over Two Decades

"There was just a guy in here," Hopkins continued. "He said we are the best service department in the country. Our employees have longevity, and they are people with the intelligence to handle concerns with electrical and mechanical issues, as well as GPS."

In fact, local service employees receive hands-on training at the John Deere Training Center in Wichita, and a few of the young technicians graduated from the John Deere Ag-Tech programs in Garden City and Milford, Neb. This is where they learn not only about the nuts and bolts but also the whiz-bang, high-tech components of modern farm equipment.

Precision farming is "where it is at now," Hopkins said. "You don't steer the tractor; it steers itself off a satellite. If you are planting corn, that planter works off a satellite. It controls what you put into the ground. Plus, it will shut itself off so you don't plant over what you have already planted. This saves time and money."

Hopkins acknowledged that some farmers were resistant to the new technology at first "but now they demand it, especially the younger generation."

The company president learned the ins and outs of farm-machinery dealerships during his long career in the industry. About 20 years ago, he came to Great Bend from Garden City; he operated three CASE IH dealerships in southwest Kansas. "I had a rapport with some John Deere people and they wanted me to buy a dealership," he said. "This is one of those things you just fall into."





The business, which has expanded the original building by more than 30,000 square feet and added a second building for the lawn equipment, collaborates with other John Deere dealers to find the right part and get it into the hands of the farmer. That pesky computer comes in handy here too.

Some maintenance and repair work is done at the shop, but GBFE also operates eight mobile units that travel to the field. However, the farm field isn't the only destination for GBFE's products; its lawn and garden department for homes and businesses has been growing in recent years. "Lawn and garden has become successful because of Everett Royer," Hopkins said. "I had to get psyched up to get into that part of the business. I had to change my way of thinking."

Royer, marketing manager, noted that the residential and non-ag business markets were there waiting to be tapped. And GBFE had the capability to cater to this niche. "Les put the right people in place," Royer commented. "And now we have a full line of lawn and garden equipment."

The product line includes everything from trimmers to zero-turn-radius mowers to Gator utility vehicles. The dealership also recently added Honda products to the mix.

All these factors add up to GBFE being part of John Deere's success. "John Deere is the best in the farm equipment industry – the best merchandiser of equipment there is," Hopkins said. "We have built on to the shop three times. It all gets back to the dealership and service."









In 1993 Hopkins and his business partner, Cecil O'Brate of Garden City, bought GBFE, the former Taylor Equipment at the same location. They remain co-owners.

In those early days there were 13 employees; today the total is 32. "All of us pride ourselves on getting to the customer quickly, diagnosing the problem and fixing the problem," Hopkins commented. "We guarantee all our work for a whole year. We can do that because of the employees."

The other type of "machine" that comes into play is the computer. "I hate the computer with a passion," Hopkins laughed. "But we are what we are because of it."

He explained that GBFE sells new machinery only in its fivecounty service area but the computer allows used-machinery sales all over the United States and some foreign countries. "This has helped with the feast and famine of farming," he said, noting GBFE's territory entails Barton, Pawnee, Stafford, Rush and Russell counties.

available for those who want to capture and tag monarch butterflies. Participants will receive information about the tagging process before heading out with a tagging leader to search for Monarch butterflies.

Kids can play in the mud and make a seed bomb, composed of clay, compost, water and seeds, to take home. Then try their hand at slinging milkweed seed bombs into the prairie area using giant slingshots. Butterfly crafts, temporary tattoos, games and other activities will round out the morning.

Butterfly milkweed seeds will be available free to those who would like to encourage monarchs to their yards and gardens. Information on butterfly-friendly plants and other attractants will be available and visitors may also walk through the wildflower/butterfly garden to view examples of butterfly-friendly plants.
