or the third year in a row, the regional June Jaunt Festival will bring the City of Great Bend to life during the first weekend of June. From Thursday, June 5th through Sunday, June 9th, thousands of travelers will take in parts of the jaunt from Tribune, Kansas to Ellinwood, Kansas along Highway 96 to experience arts, antiques, cuisine, and music at its grass roots. Since Great Bend is the largest community along the route, the event schedule is busier than ever!

Great Bend Community Coordinator Christina Hayes is not only responsible for the Great Bend events, but also serves as the regional chair for the representatives from each community who collaboratively present the annual festival. "The idea for the festival actually started in Dighton and Scott City based on the antiquing and swap meets happening in other states along rural highways," Hayes says. "We are proud to collaborate with seven other communities to present a long weekend full of good old fashioned family fun and entertainment."

The communities of Tribune, Leoti, Scott City, Dighton, Ness City, Rush Center, Great Bend, and Ellinwood each buy in to the promotional expenses required to present a regional festival. Pamphlets are produced, advertising is placed, and word of mouth spreads about the exciting line-up of activities. New this year is a Community Garage Sale element, which will be incorporated in a majority of the participating towns.

"The City of Great Bend focuses our efforts on both attracting visitors and providing entertainment for local residents," Hayes says. "June Jaunt truly offers something for every age and interest group, and we hope our community comes out to enjoy the festival and try something new."

For families with children, June Jaunt offers lots to see and do. A few of the highlighted events might include the outdoor movie on Friday, June 6th where Willy Wonka & The Chocolate Factory will be shown at no charge in Jack Kilby Square.

The next day, bring the kids back to the square to check out the Relay for Life Kids Zone with inflatables, face painting, and more. Jumbo yard games, a model train display, and a "Be a Princess" photo booth will keep the family busy all morning. — *Cont. on Page 2*

There will even be a Children's Stage with performances from

Matthew the Magician and Tricks of Light Fire at various times on Saturday. After eating with one of the concessions vendors, jaunt north down Main Street to check out the Nex-Tech Zoo Fest inside the Great Bend Brit Spaugh Zoo before exploring the Parking Lot Flea Market at 2100 Kansas Avenue.

Sunday after a morning rest, join the crowds at Veterans Memorial Park for the Optimist Club Fun Zone with more inflatables, kite flying, and a community barbecue. Coolers are allowed, but no glass. United Way will be selling hot dogs for those who don't want to pack their own picnic.

For those without children, there is still a huge list of activities to check out! Thursday night things will kick off with the Summer Street Stroll Farmers Market and Kansas Speedweek Cruise Night, followed by the City Band Concert at Jack Kilby Square. Friday night, cosmic bowling will be available at Walnut Bowl from 10 p.m. to midnight. But don't stay out too late. Saturday will start early with the 12h Annual MDA Run Because You Can event at the Great Bend Fire Department, followed by the Outdoor Vendor Fair, Flea Market, and Sunflower Diversfied Services Community Garage Sale. Saturday at 1:30 p.m., over a dozen teams from local businesses will converge at Jack Kilby Square to compete in the 2nd Annual Great Bend Business Olympics – a wacky spectacle you won't want to miss. Dodgeball tournaments, Model Airplane demonstrations (weather permitting), live entertainment, and many other activities will provide lots to see between events. Saturday night, wind down in the Community Beer Garden while you enjoy free live music in Jack Kilby Square. On Sunday, a Sand Volleyball Tournament and Community Barbecue will bring hundreds to Veterans Memorial Park, while others will be out enjoying the birdhouse tour, scavenger hunt, bead workshop, Gardens Galore event, and more.

Community Coordinator Christina Hayes works tirelessly to organize the huge four-day festival, but she doesn't do it without help. "It takes a lot of people pitching in to pull off all the events that happen during June Jaunt," Hayes says. "Organizations involved include the Great Bend Recreation Commission, the Model Association of Central Kansas (MACK), the GBHS Marketing Class, the Barton County Young Professionals group, the Golden Belt Model Train Club, the Great Bend Convention & Visitors Bureau, the City of Great Bend staff, and countless businesses who give of their time and resources to add something to the festivities."

Great Bend High School Named Best High School By U.S. News & World Report

In April, U.S. News and World Report released their annual ranking of the United State's best high schools, and Great Bend High School made the list. "We've always thought we do a pretty good job of educating our students and we keep striving to do better," said GBHS Principal Tim Friess. "It's nice to get a little recognition."



Out of 312 high schools in Kansas, Great Bend was among the 32 that made the national rankings. Two schools received silver badges, and the remainder received bronze badges. The report listed 500 gold ranked schools, based on highest college readiness. Silver ranked schools included high-performing schools with lower college readiness.

East High School in Wichita was ranked first in the state, and Liberal Senior High was ranked second. The remaining 30 schools were not individually ranked. Proficiency in Math and Reading were key factors in ranking. Great Bend is 88 percent proficient in math, higher than both top ranking Kansas schools and 87 percent proficient in reading.

Midwest Energy, Inc Celebrates 75 Years of Service

Midwest Energy is a utility cooperative unlike any other. The Midwest Energy you know today has in its DNA more than a dozen electric and natural gas companies, cooperatives and municipal utilities, all brought together to form a cooperative with one goal in mind: providing safe, reliable and efficient energy services for our customer-owners.

It all began in July 1939, when 20 incorporators from the rural areas around Great Bend formed Central Kansas Electric Cooperative. W.D. Essmiller, one of the 20, was elected President of the Board, and oversaw the cooperative's growth from 68 customers in 1940 to more than 4,700 when he left the Board in 1959.

Jack Goodman served as CKEC's General Manager for four decades beginning in 1951, and led the cooperative through a series of acquisitions and mergers, the most notable being the purchase of the investor-owned (and much larger) Central Kansas Power Company, which was finalized in 1981. The form of closing resulted in CKEC merging into CKP, with the surviving corporation renamed Midwest Energy, Inc. The new company served more than 30,000 customers in central and western Kansas.

"Our roots are deep in the Great Bend area, and we've grown the company from there for 75 years," said Earnie Lehman, Midwest Energy's General Manager. "Some of our longest-serving employees are from Great Bend, and we have several second-generation families who have grown up with the company over all those years."

Since 1981, Midwest Energy has grown significantly, expanding its electric and natural gas operations through more than a dozen acquisitions of municipal, investor-owned and cooperative electric and natural gas systems. Today, the cooperative continues to grow, serving more than 50,000 electric and 42,000 natural gas customers in 41 Kansas counties. Great Bend remains a key location for Midwest Energy, with 36 of the company's 288 employees

operating from facilities on Patton Road.
