Barton Community College celebrates inaugural Fine and Performing Arts Hall of **Fame induction**

The Barton Community College Fine and Performing Arts department honored its rich artistic legacy last month during the Holiday Concert with the inaugural induction of four influential faculty members into the newly established Fine and Performing Arts Hall of Fame.

The Fine and Performing Arts Hall of Fame was the vision of Dean of Fine and Performing Arts Brian Howe. The selection process involved a committee of Barton faculty, staff, and community members with historied knowledge and interest in the College's arts programs. He said the Hall of Fame recognizes individuals who have contributed to the success, quality, and reputation of Barton's Fine and Performing Arts programs.

"This Hall of Fame represents more than individual achievements—it symbolizes the legacy of creativity, passion, and education that Barton has fostered for decades," he said. "The contributions of these inductees continue to resonate within our programs and inspire future generations of students."

This year's inductees were chosen for their pioneering vision and lasting impact on Barton's Fine and Performing Arts programs.

JB Webster (Director of Instrumental Music, 1969-1991)

JB Webster served as Barton's Director of Instrumental Music from 1969 to 1991 and later contributed to the College's leadership as Chairman of Barton's Board of Trustees. He is remembered for his dedication to music education and statewide leadership in higher education governance. His legacy lives on through his children, Marc Webster

and Denise Shoff, who both pursued careers in music education. His children accepted the award in memory of Webster and expressed their gratitude for recognizing their late father's lifelong dedication to music and education.

Ken Shaheen (Choral Director, 1970-1992)

Ken Shaheen led Barton's choral programs for more than

two decades, shaping the lives of countless students through his passion for vocal music and performance. Shaheen, who personally accepted his award, reflected on the joy of witnessing the continued growth and success of Barton's choral ensembles, many of which he helped establish.


Steve Dudek (Instructor of Art, 1977-2018)

Steve Dudek's contributions to Barton's art program spanned more than 40 years, during which he fostered creativity and innovation in the visual arts. His influence extends beyond the classroom, inspiring generations of artists, including current Barton 3D Instructor Mark Freeman, who accepted the award on Dudek's behalf. Freeman credited Dudek with inspiring his journey in art education.

Bob Loss (Director of Theatre, 1987-2007)

Bob Loss brought theatrical productions to life at Barton for 20 years, enriching the campus and community with engaging performances. His commitment to storytelling and theatrical education left a lasting impression on students and colleagues alike. Loss accepted his award and shared heartfelt memories of his time at Barton, emphasizing the importance of the arts in education.

During the Holiday Concert, each honoree was recognized between performances by Barton's music ensembles, groups many of the inductees played a key role in developing. The Fine and Performing Arts Hall of Fame will serve as a tribute to those who have shaped the arts at the College, ensuring their legacy lives on for years to come.

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All Stars organizers encourage sixth-grade teachers to participate

Since All Stars has become popular in all USD 428 elementary schools, as well as two other facilities, Michelle Daniel encourages sixth-grade teachers throughout central Kansas to consider the program.

Daniel, student and family advocate at Riley School in Great Bend, collaborates with Marissa Woodmansee, Juvenile Services executive director, to offer All Stars in sixthgrade classrooms. "We want to increase the number of students who delay the onset of using drugs and alcohol," Daniel said. "All Star lessons teach students to think critically about what type of future they want. "They delve into future possibilities, while All Stars cautions them about roadblocks to achieving their dreams. We hope they will not choose drugs or alcohol, or other risky behavior because it could get in the way of attaining success in life."

Daniel, who has been involved in All Stars for more than a decade, added that students also learn that "the future is not given to them. They must work hard to reach their goals." Student and family advocates, along with math and reading coaches, teach a 45-minute lesson once a week for 16 weeks. In addition to USD 428 schools, Ellinwood and Central Plains are involved. Parents sign a permission form for All Stars. "We get positive feedback from parents and teachers alike," Daniel commented. "For example, parents like to participate by helping their kids with homework four times during the four-month program, and teachers like the curriculum and enjoy co-teaching."

Typically, she added, the Kansas **Communities That Care Survey indicates** All Stars helps students look at their lives from new perspectives, while considering what obstacles may come their way. Daniel noted that she and her Riley School colleagues appreciate their partnership with Juveniles Services, which covers Barton, Ellsworth, Rice, Russell and Stafford counties. "When we need quidance, materials, prizes or training, they are always willing to help," she explained. "Also, Juvenile Services provides food and support during our end-of-class celebrations. They have even taught a few lessons for us, when necessary."

Juvenile Services

Daniel deserves a lot of credit for getting All Stars off the ground, said

Marissa Woodmansee at Juvenile Services, noting Riley School became the site of a pilot program under the leadership of Daniel and JoAnn Blevins. "Michelle approached us, asking about a curriculum that followed the DARE prevention program for fifthgraders," Woodmansee recalled. "She wanted something to prepare sixth-graders for middle school. "I mentioned All Stars and how its curriculum includes preparing for the future, while considering how negative behaviors adversely affect the road to a successful life."

Daniel earned a master's in social work and "understands the importance of quiding conversations with sixth-graders," Woodmansee noted. "It is fun to see the family support advocates build strong bonds with students in All Stars. "It is also exciting to see these young people read their commitments to the future during end-ofyear celebrations."

Woodmansee strongly encouraged other schools in the 20th Judicial District to learn more about All Stars. Her number is 620-793-1930.

USDA RUS Distance Learning Grants

USDA is making approximately \$40 million in funding available under the Distance Learning and Telemedicine (DLT) Grant Program. This program funds distance learning and telemedicine equipment, like audio and video equipment. These funds will help digitally connect people to education, training and health care resources that are otherwise unavailable or limited in remote parts of the country.

DLT funding can be used to help:

Students to participate in classes that may be in locations too far to access in person.

Teachers to provide their expertise, trainings and educational services to

students across the country.

Patients to seek specialized care and treatment from medical professionals without needing to leave their homes or communities.

Eligible applicants include state and local governmental entities, federally recognized Tribes, nonprofits and for-profit businesses. Applications must be submitted electronically through grants.gov no later than March 6, 2025.


