SHOP TALK IN 60

In November, the Chamber hosted a special roundtable dubbed "Shop Talk in 60" with the topic being "Business NOT-As-Usual this Holiday Season & Beyond." The purpose was to bring our members together to share observations, hurdles and hopefully some solutions along the way. The dialogue was found worthwhile by those in attendance, which included members coming from retail, service, and attraction-based businesses.

We invited Jon Prescott to guide the conversation and we were able to identify some of the pitfalls as well as generate some ideas. We captured the key takeaways to share with our members and hope you'll attend the next discussion scheduled on January 17th, 2023.

OBSERVATIONS:

- Black Friday has now extended to Black November and created something of a mess when it comes to local businesses trying to compete for dollars.
- As of November 15th, sales and traffic had been slower compared to all of 2022.
- Visitors are spending less time at places like the Kansas Wetlands Education Center which is full of interactive experiences.
- Resources are at an all-time low in terms of supply and workforce.

INTERPRETATIONS

- Consumers are cautious with rising costs and inflation and may be spending less out of fear of looming recession.
- Consumers are waiting to shop for Christmas until after Thanksgiving.
- Society is now an expert in all things with a DIY mentality and ordering kits from Amazon and China.
- People's behavior was forever altered following the COVID pandemic.

IDEAS GENERATED

- Locally, we should focus less on Black Friday and more on Small Business Saturday.
- Businesses should be providing more and better education to the consumer regarding product, services, etc.
- Educate your customers on WHY they should shop local.
- Businesses should use eachother's traffic and take the opportunity to promote other businesses in the area: make the recommendations as consumers seem to respond to a personal recommendation
 - How can we educate business owners on what's in their neighboring stores to make those personal recommendations?
 - The Chamber will look into organizing a "Business Walk-About" or bring back the Business & Education Tours.
- Support the #LoveGBKS and promote why we all love Great Bend.
- Train those on the floor to spend more time and effort conversing with the consumers while they're in the store and capitalizing on the traffic in the moment. Deliver the education, experience and engagement right then.
 - Employees will need to be trained on reading the customers and taking queues from them in the moment.

- Ordering new merchandise.
- Using social media to provide education on services to demonstrate why I'm the expert and why consumers should shop with me.
- Providing referral coupons to everyone who enters the business.

Great Bend Economic Development Launches Entrepreneurship Competition, IGNITE Rural Business, to bring businesses to Barton County

On November 19, 2022, Great Bend Economic Development launched a new competition for entrepreneurs to open/start a business in Barton County. New inventions/businesses are encouraged to apply as well as startups. This competition exists to empower, support, and cultivate entrepreneurs. Here in Barton County, we strive to champion creativity and innovative thinking and complement a project or idea with the tools, resources, and investment necessary to see it thrive. We aim for this competition to be the first of many efforts to continue that mission in a positive and impactful way.



Those interested in competing will have the opportunity for exposure of their business, assistance from local business professionals, and three businesses are walking away with substantial prize money. With an emphasis on bringing business to Barton County, the Ignite committee is partnering with NetworkKansas and the Small Business Development Center. NetworkKansas has facilitated the use of Venture Dash as the contestant portal. Venture Dash allows contestants to submit materials and track their progress. In addition to weighing in on the competition, both NetworkKansas and the Small Business Development Center connect contestants to mentors and assistance with their business plan.

IGNITE Rural Busines's is launch coincided with celebration of Global Entrepreneurship Week. If you are looking for local inspiration, GBED has interviewed some of Barton County's entrepreneurs and posted those videos on the Great Bend Economic Development YouTube Channel, as well as @GBEDinc on TikTok.

The IGNITE Competition:

In round one, all competitors submit the necessary materials through the Venture Dash platform. The link to the portal is on the GBED website. In round two, the competition pool is narrowed. Businesses will be selected to engage in a one-on-one meeting with a business planning professional. To have viable businesses in the next round, each contestant will be paired with a local business mentor in a category of the contestant's desire. Contestants will have a final Q&A with the IGNITE Team before the final five contestants are chosen for the live IGNITE Finale event in October 2023. A few extra takeaways for those interested in entering the competition include startups (Startups are considered businesses less than 5 years old and with 10 or fewer employees) and all applicantsmustbe18yearsandolder.TheapplicationdeadlineisJune30th,2023.Rules,eliqibility requirements, quidelines, and applications are live and available on www.qbedinc.com/IGNITE. The live IGNITE Rural Business competition finale (on October 5th, 2023) will have participants pitching to our Jury in front of a live audience at the Crest Theater in Great Bend, then our Jury will conduct a Q&A session following every pitch. Composed of experts from the private and/or public sectors with relevant business experience, the jury will base their decisions on innovation, creativity, long-term business strategy, and viability. The winner of the Grand Finale will win \$50,000! Second place is awarded \$30,000, and third place gets \$10,000. Those following along the journey of the IGNITE Rural Business competition will vote online for the People's Choice Award and award a business with \$5,000.

ElderCare Encourages Giving Tree Donationas for Home-Care Clients

When last year's ElderCare Giving Tree project started, Executive Director Brandi Gruber said it was especially important because of the pandemic. She is saying the same thing this year. "Even though COVID

risks have greatly decreased, the virus continues to play a role in the lives of many of our clients," Gruber said. "They are not getting out of the house as much as they used to. It is simply a different world now."The Giving Tree is located at the ElderCare office, 1121 Washington, Great Bend. The office is open to the public from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays.

The tree is trimmed with decorative tags that represent ElderCare clients and their particular needs. Actual names are not used because of privacy concerns. Gifts should be returned to the ElderCare office by Dec.

14. Gifts could include blankets, warm clothing, toiletry items, and crossword-puzzle and word-search books. Gift cards for a few staples at the grocery store also are appreciated. Counties involved are Barton,

Pawnee, Edwards, Stafford and Pratt. ElderCare serves about 250 clients in this area. Anyone who receives home-care services in these counties is eligible for the Giving Tree project. Anyone who knows a senior citizen who could benefit from this project is encouraged to contact ElderCare soon. The non-profit agency's home services include personal care, household tasks and respite for caregivers. Registered nurses offer medication management, wellness checks and

companionship. However, if those hours aren't convenient for donors, they may call 620-792-5942 or email bgruber@eldercareks.org for an appointment.

Mckinney Shares Friend's Aster Estates Story During Special Month

When Frank McKinney learned in April last year that Aster Estates was about to open, he knew he found the answer for his friend, Scott Thein. As a result, Thein was the first resident of Aster Estates, the home-plus residence at 155 NW 10th Ave, just north of the city limits on McKinley. McKinney wanted to share Thein's story in observance of National Hospice & Palliative Care Month. McKinney and Thein had been friends for about 15 years after meeting in New York, where Thein was living at the time. "Scott visited Great Bend and liked it here." McKinney recalled. "I suggested he move here. McKinney acknowledged that his friend "wasn't sure at first about Aster Estates because Pam Lewis might be too motherly." Lewis, a

registered nurse, owns Aster Estates and lives there. "Scott felt safe here – emotionally and physically," McKinney emphasized. "He had a unique childhood but after he had been at Aster Estates for a little while, he said 'I finally found a home." He had his own chair at the dinner table and enjoyed a birthday cake for the first time, McKinney explained, noting just two ways Aster Estates made him feel at home. "We are here for the families too."

Lewis also noted that when hospice care is provided away from the person's private home, "some of the pressure on the family is relieved. They can visit their loved one any time but they also have the respite and support they deserve."
