Zoo Gets Facelift & New Exhibits

Improvements at the Zoo Prove Popular with Residents & Visitors

Last month, the City of Great Bend along with the Great Bend Zoological Society unveiled several exciting new additions to the Great Bend Brit Spaugh Zoo. The most notable was a newly expanded grizzly bear exhibit, which debuted over June Jaunt weekend. On opening day alone, more than 1,200 visitors came through the zoo to see the changes.

"We started thinking about this project in 2015, and were planning to do something smaller that we could tackle ourselves," says Sara Hamlin, Curator & Zoo Supervisor. "But then we found a grant from the Dorothy Moses Morrison trust, and applied. When we learned that we had gotten the grant for over \$230,000, we were so excited."

Once bids started being accepted from experienced zoo contractors, the costs were stacking up quickly. But after meeting with the foundation's advisors in September of last year, the group generously stepped up again to fund another chunk of the \$800,000 project and the City funded the rest.

The City hired an architect firm out of Wichita that specializes in zoos, as well as a contractor with similar credentials. The new exhibit more than tripled in size and features three small ponds with a stream connecting them and flowing into one larger pond. Right at the base of the large pond is a viewing window so visitors can watch the play in the water.

"Some other popular features in the exhibit are a cave feature that lets visitors peek through the cracks to get an up-close view of the bears," Hamlin says. "We also added a whole new play structure that didn't exist before at all. Bears need to climb and play, and it also provides some shade."

The zoo's oldest bear, nicknamed "Old Man" by the zoo staff, is named Max. He is somewhere in his mid 30s, and came from Yellowstone National Park when he was a few years old. - Continued on Page 2

The younger set of bears, Winnie, Pooh and Piglet, are almost five years old now and came to Great Bend when they were very young.

Other recent improvements at the Zoo include the addition of two new lion cubs that arrived last fall. The Zoological Society paid for a new sidewalk in the butterfly house, and a group of master gardeners added new plants specifically catered to butterflies as

well. The Zoological Society raises money through annual memberships and fundraising events, and members get special perks. For example, members get to attend a private viewing event on July 21st. More details can be found about that on the Zoo Society's facebook page.

"Plans are in the works to add a new Bison exhibit as the next major undertaking, but funding will be the deciding factor on when that can be installed," Hamlin says. "We are also getting a

new website for the Zoo very soon, and anticipate that launching in August or soon after."

The Great Bend Brit Spaugh Zoo attracts more than 40,000 visitors each year, and those numbers climb from year to year. In addition to Sara, who has been the Curator & Supervisor for over three years, the Zoo also employs two front desk staff, 2 maintenance staff, and 5 zookeepers.

"The Zoo is truly a gem in our community, and so many people comment about how much it has changed over the past few years," Hamlin says. "Not only does it attract thousands of people from out of town each year, but it also provides free, quality entertainment for families that live here. We are very proud of our animals."



GBRC to Improve Disc Golf and Playground at Vet's


The Great Bend Recreation Commission received a donation from the Golden Belt Community Foundation with the Kansas Health Foundation Children's Health Endowment and the GBRC Foundation for \$41,047 for two upcoming recreation projects slated to begin fall of 2018: Improvements to the 18-hole Disc Golf Course and new toddler playground located on the southeast side of Veteran's Memorial Park.

"The Disc Golf Course Project will begin to move forward in July," said Diann Henderson, Executive Director of the Great Bend Recreation Commission. "The scope





of improvements to the current 18-hold course will include utilizing a professional consultant to provide us with a quality championship design that includes new baskets and signage and adequate concrete pads. We are hoping for a course redesign that can be challenging but fair





The Toddler Playground Project will commence later this fall. This project will include new toddler playground equipment and surfacing designed for active 2-5 year olds which will replace the existing toddler playground located at Veteran's Park.

The Recreation Commission staff and City of Great Bend Park Department staff will work collectively in implementing these two projects in the fall of 2018 and spring of 2019.

When Barry Bowers and his partners sat down to decide on a name for their new venture, they "didn't want to just string a bunch of names together." Instead, they wanted to convey their wide range of accounting services.

The word "spectrum" came to mind and caught the partners' attention. The result was the opening of Spectrum CPA Partners LLC on Oct. 1, 2016, at 1400 Polk. "We thought 'spectrum' described the full gamut of our services," Bowers said. "We also chose the word 'partners,' which refers to our clients – not those of us who are partners in the firm. "From the beginning," he added, "we have differentiated ourselves. Together, we have a deep range of experience and knowledge. But we are not so big that we lose the personal touch."

That personal touch means clients may call anytime and talk with a real person, not a recording. "You are not just passed to person after person," Bowers said. "One of us always answers the phone. When new clients come to us, this is what they are looking for. And they really appreciate it.

"We are partners and advisors," he continued. "Clients can connect with us anytime by calling, emailing or just stopping by."

Spectrum serves a mix of private businesses, non-profit organizations and individuals with accounting and income-tax services throughout Kansas and in other states. Currently, the smallest business is a one-person venture and the largest has 48 employees. "We have the capability of serving even bigger businesses," Bowers noted. "But many of our clients are small businesses with one to 10 employees."

Spectrum is the result of the merger between (David) Holste & Bowers LLC, an accounting firm that opened here in 2008, and Ray A. Cheely Chartered, a long-time local accounting firm. Cheely passed away in 2009 but four employees stayed with the firm. Two of those, David Zink and Cynthia Lockwood, became part of Spectrum.

"I would like to say our successful merger was the result of good planning. But it was just good luck," Bowers laughed. "The merger went more smoothly than I would have ever imagined.

"When I talk with other people about their mergers, I hear that our experience is a rarity. All the pieces came together because this really is an amazing group of people. They are caring, helpful and willing to learn. All of this makes a huge difference."

There were five employees at Holste & Bowers; that number grew to 10 with the merger. The current 11 employees are: Holste, Bowers and Zink, all certified public accountants and partners; Lockwood, accountant and partner; Sheri Yager, Colleen Burton, Rick Warnken, John Lane and Tammy Nye, all staff accountants; Penny Dreiling, bookkeeper and receptionist; and Diane Poncin, additional receptionist during tax season.

"Everyone here is a long-time Barton County resident," Bowers commented. "Some were born and raised here. Individually, we serve on many civic and non-profit boards. As an office, we deliver Meals on Wheels and sponsor Operation Christmas Child. We are always talking about how to be more involved."

Spectrum's service menu includes: payroll services; QuickBooks training; business consulting and planning; bookkeeping; income-tax services; investment tax planning; financial and estate planning; and human resources consulting.

"But we are always creating new services to help you succeed," Bowers said. "If you need help with something that isn't on the list, don't hesitate to ask."

The firm also keeps on top of ever-changing technology. "We hear that in just a few years, everything will be different," Bowers said. "We have been here just 18 months and already there have been changes. The learning curve is huge. But it is exciting to be part of finding ways to make life a little easier for our clients."





Veteran Cardiologist Sees Patients at St. Rose

Jeffery Curtis, M.D., and his colleagues at Hays Medical Center had been talking about ways to offer Great Bend-area residents even more access to cardiology services close to home. As a result, Dr. Curtis is now seeing patients at the St. Rose/HaysMed Specialty Clinic on a regular basis. His first day was May 23. "We will be caring for patients with all kinds of cardiac issues at St. Rose," said Dr. Curtis, a Hays native. "Patients shouldn't have to travel for all their appointments or for some common tests and treatment."



Dr. Curtis will see patients who have had heart attacks, as well as those with atrial fibrillation, arrhythmias, chest pain, congestive heart failure, blocked arteries, heart-valve issues, high blood pressure and high cholesterol. "We also monitor patients who have had pacemakers or defibrillators implanted," Dr. Curtis noted. "And we can perform echocardiograms here at St. Rose."

St. Rose also offers three cardiovascular screening tests on site. Dr. Curtis has 25 years of experience performing angioplasties and implanting stents at cardiac catheterization labs.

"Angioplasties and stents revolutionized the treatment of heart disease," he said. "These procedures can interrupt a heart attack, which can help save the heart muscle. This, in turn, can help prevent congestive heart failure."

Dr. Curtis is a 1973 graduate of Hays High School; he earned a bachelor's degree in general science at Fort Hays State University in 1977. He graduated from the University of Kansas School of Medicine in 1981, was an internal medicine resident at KU from 1981–84 and chief internal medicine resident there from 1984–85. He then completed a Fellowship in cardiovascular disease at the University of North Carolina from 1985–88.

Dr. Curtis practiced general and interventional cardiology at Stormont Vail HealthCare in Topeka from 1988–2002 and at HaysMed from 2002 to 2013. He then practiced both internal medicine and cardiology at HaysMed.

St. Rose Health Center specializes in primary care, prevention and wellness. 


