Great Bend Airfest Returns With More Attractions Than Ever

This September marks the 75th anniversary of the Great Bend Army Airfield, which was built in 1943 for the training of B-29 aircrews. These aircraft were part of the first B-29 combat wing of World War II, and during the Great Bend Airfest weekend September 28-30, the world's only two flying B-29 Superfortresses, Doc & Fifi, will fly together for only the 2nd time in 53 years!

"Great Bend's 2018 Airfest will be the largest gathering of airworthy WWII and Korean Conflict warbirds anywhere in the central United States this year," says Martin Miller, manager for the Great Bend Municipal Airport. "The two signature aircraft will fly together in four separate shows over the 3-day weekend, and they'll be joined by aerobatic demonstrations and formation flights. It'll be a special moment for all ages."

The local Airfest event happens every three years, and always draws a crowd. This year, the unique lineup of rare aircraft, flying demonstrations, and plane rides will make this even more popular than in previous events. "The B-29, P-51, C-45, Stearman, T-6, and helicopter will all be providing rides all three days," Miller says. "Costs for flights vary, but those who've gone in the past will tell you how memorable the experience is, especially if you appreciate the history of the aircraft."

On Saturday the 29th, U.S. Congressman Roger Marshall will be present to help honor the airfield and all American veterans during a special celebration to honor those who have served our country. Following the second airshow of the day, dignitaries will make a few brief remarks before a 1940's style hangar dance begins featuring the nationally known talents of the "Ladies for Liberty" accompanied by the J. Bennet Band. The dance will open with instruction from Lee Ann June and demonstrations from experienced dance couples. The evening also includes a cash bar.

Not only will visitors experience history and see famous air shows, they'll also enjoy great food, view military equipment displays, and have the opportunity to get airplane and helicopter rides in a relaxed, family friendly environment. "It's rare that we can provide such an incredible event for our region," says Christina Hayes, Great Bend Community Coordinator. "Every Great Bend Airfest gets better and better, and we are excited to collaborate to provide this event that is so rich in history, entertainment, and education to honor those who have served."

In September 2008, Barry and Daphne Stalcup were just venturing out on their own to start a new business called Comfort Pro. Little did they know that it would see the immense growth they've experienced since that time. "I was nervous at first, because we had two kids under two years old, and I was a stay-at-home mom," Barry's wife Daphne recalls. "We got a small loan and took things one day at a time."

Barry had been plumbing since he was 16 years old. After working for another local company for over a decade, he decided he had bigger dreams. "Daphne was always really supportive Right after we started, the economy was crashing and things weren't looking good. But against all odds, we made it work."

Comfort Pro's first location was a small rental shop with 800 square feet at the back of the building that now houses Bling on Lakin Avenue. Soon after, Barry hired his first employee, who still works for Comfort Pro today. "That first year, there would be some days where we'd only have 4 calls. And other days we couldn't keep up," Barry says. "It was a roller coaster for sure."

A couple years later, he purchased his second location at 2700 Main Street. For several years, Barry was able to add an employee each

"We would pay the bills around the dinner table at night after the

kids went to bed," Barry remembers. "Daphne always wrote out the checks and envelopes because my handwriting was so bad, and my aunt Kristy Stalcup, did the books for us for a while. It was a small operation and we worked day and night on it at the beginning."

Comfort Pro really took off when the owners of M&F Plumbing, George and Patty Smith, approached Barry about purchasing their business which had a location in Great Bend as well as a location in Larned. The acquisition was finalized in 2014 along with a new business partner, at which point the Comfort Pro team grew from 5 employees to 15 employees overnight. George and Patty stayed on for about a year, helping the Stalcups with the operation and making the transition as smooth as possible.

For a few months, the Comfort Pro team crammed into M&F's building on Frey Street until they could move into a much larger facility at 503 Williams in the spring of 2015, where they still base out of today. The 24,000 square foot facility gives the rapidly growing company the room it needs to stock ample parts and inventory of furnaces and air conditioners. "As we grow, we continue to get better rates on our equipment because of our volume, which helps us save our customers money and get the project completed much sooner," Stalcup says.

Once the Great Bend location was situated, it was time to upgrade the Larned location. In 2017, Barry purchased a different building that had been an eyesore on Highway 56. "We completely renovated it so that we could add a showroom to sell new appliances and expand into appliance repair over there," he says. "My grandpa grew up in Larned, and M&F had been in Larned since the 1950's so we were definitely committed to staying there and serving the people of Pawnee County."

Barry was in negotiations with Rick and Karen Gates from Russell, Kansas to purchase their business known as R&M Heating and Cooling. The small business only offered HVAC, which left new opportunities for that year, Comfort Pro closed on its third location. Between the two had joined the team in the years prior, the growing business now has 31 employees with 25 trucks doing new construction and service work all over Central Kansas. In addition to plumbing and HVAC work, the local contractor also

specializes in water treatment with water softeners and RO systems. Comfort Pro also offers air purifiers and humidifiers, and is the only certified provider for radon testing and mitigation in the area, adding air quality to their impressive resume.

itself, you have to jump on it," Barry says. "We've expanded our services and specialties a lot since we first started, just to meet the demand in the area."

These new services include fiberglass repair for tubs and showers, recordable diagnostic imaging on a state-of-the-art self-leveling full color sewer camera. mini-split systems and variable refrigeration flow systems (VRF), and more.

Despite immense growth and a rapidly expanding team of professionals, Barry and Daphne have remained focused on providing quality work at an affordable price. "We want to create a business our kids can be proud of. Our daughter, Kennedy, wants to be the secretary some day and our son. Mason. has shown an interest in taking over the family business down the road," Barry says. "It's important that we treat customers with respect and we always stand

"In the beginning, Barry said he wanted to stay small - just a couple guys and a couple trucks. Now we laugh about that, but I'm proud of everything he's accomplished," Daphne says. "It's been a wild ride these first ten years, and we couldn't have done it without our family, our amazing employees, and our loyal customers. We hope to continue growing in the next decade."

Shafer Art Gallery

Known and founded initially for its permanent collection of bronze statues crafted by Leonard E. "Gus" Shafer, this modern sleek space has hosted dozens of shows featuring local artists and family friendly events as

well as nationally and internationally known traveling exhibits.

The Gallery's roots date back to 1981, when Mrs. Faerie Denman of Great Bend donated the extensive 507-piece art collection that she and her husband Cedric, had acquired over the years. The collection, valued at more than \$200,000, demanded proper storage and the means by which Barton could share the artwork with the community. Now



numbering more than 800 pieces, the Permanent Art Collection includes 28 of Shafer's bronzes and more than 100 works by Great Bend native Charles B. Rogers. Fine & Performing Arts: Dance | Music | Theatre | Art

Barton has completely revamped its academic dance offerings with the hiring of a new instructor, Danika Bielek. The program boasts generous scholarships to dance majors and a rejuvenated Barton Dance Theatre, the program's resident student dance company, which takes the study of dance to a deeper level and

gives students a chance to perform live.

The music department has earned a reputation in higher education across the country and beyond for both vocal and instrumental talent, drawing students from abroad to study under the college's experienced instructors, including Steve Lueth, instrumental, and Sara Oberle, vocal. Barton is frequently the only community college invited to perform alongside the state's university bands at the annual Kansas chapter of the National Association for Music Education conference. The music department hosts several concerts available for the public to enjoy throughout the year. Members of the community are also recruited to play in the Community Band and Orchestra and the Central Kansas Community Choir. Music groups include the Barton Jazz Band, Hilltop Singers, Concert Choir, Orchestra, Da Capo, Dolce and Pep Band.





Barton's Theatre Department, under the guidance of Dr. Rick Abel, hosts several performances each year including a small student-directed performance, original plays by community members and famous musicals and plays with name recognition. All the plays are available for the public to enjoy for nominal admission.
