FIRST EVER MANUFACTURING DAY TO BRING AWARENESS TO CRITICAL INDUSTRY OCTOBER 4TH

he Great Bend Chamber of Commerce & Economic Development is celebrating Manufacturing Day in 2019 and manufacturing in Great Bend, KS with our first "Made in GBK." Held annually on the first Friday in October, Manufacturing Day helps show the reality of modern manufacturing careers by encouraging thousands of companies and educational institutions around the nation to open their doors to students, parents, teachers and community leaders.

According to the National Association of Manufacturers, more than 18.5 million U.S. jobs are supported by manufacturing, and every dollar spent in manufacturing creates \$1.40 for the U.S. economy. With U.S. manufacturing being the ninth largest economy in the world and making up nearly 12% of our country's gross domestic product (GDP), the future of this industry is incredibly important.



"Manufacturing Day is an opportunity for manufacturers to show their communities what they do, highlight the economic importance of manufacturing, and draw attention to rewarding manufacturing careers," says Megan Barfield, Director of Member Relations for the Great Bend Chamber of Commerce & Economic Development. "Students get the chance to see firsthand how many types of jobs are available in the manufacturing sector from welders and engineers to designers and marketing professionals."

In other communities that hosted a Manufacturing Day event for students in this format, several interesting statistics were reported:

- 84% of students were more convinced that manufacturing provides careers that are interesting and rewarding.
- 64% of students were more motivated to pursue a career in manufacturing.
- 71% of students that participated were more likely to tell friends and family about manufacturing after attending an event.



"For this first year, we have partnered with Fuller Industries, Great Bend Industries, Eldridge Fencing, Superior Essex, Great Bend High School JAG-K and Barton Community College." Barfield says, "Nearly 120 students will get the chance to tour these facilities the morning of October 4th to learn more about manufacturing right here in Barton County."

1st Ever Rock-N-Q on the Planes Slated Oct. 18-20

In the summer of 1978, a legendary music festival called Summer Jam brought thousands of spectators and concert goers to Great Bend for rock-and-roll performances, including headlining band Head East. Now, a group of visionary volunteers are working to bring back the nostalgic Americana, with Head East returning for an encore



performance along with numerous other headlining bands at the first ever Rock-N-Q on the Planes festival, happening October 18-20, 2019 at the Great Bend Expo Complex. The name for the event says it all - unforgettable rock concerts, barbecue, and all taking place at the historic WWII airfield just west of Great Bend (hence the word "planes" instead of "plains").

Other bands performing include legendary groups such as Banshee, Skid Row, Starship featuring Mickey Thomas, and Foghat. Regional favorites The David Holland Band, Ten Day Wish, Homebrew, and Jake Gill will also perform along with YouTube sensation Liliac.

If the concerts weren't enough to pique your interest, there will also be two huge barbecue competitions and lots of retail and food vendors as well. An Open BBQ Cook-Off lets teams of all experience levels compete for an impressive cash purse of \$25,000. Similarly impressive, a \$20,000 purse is being put up for the first ever Rock-N-Q National Invitational, a barbecue competition for only the top fifty rated teams in the entire country!

"We are expecting thousands of people for the barbecue competition and the live concerts," says Mark Bitter, volunteer committee member. "And outside of the enormous economic impact this will have for our community, we are the most excited about the potential this event has to generate revenue for a new non-profit organization known as Destination GB, that exists to fund community improvement projects around the City of Great Bend. Any proceeds raised after expenses are paid will be used to facilitate quality of life improvements that wouldn't be funded otherwise."

Tickets are now on sale at www.rocknq.com. General admission passes are \$89 per person for both jam-packed days of music and barbecue. There are also reserved passes for \$119 per person that get spectators in the best possible location close to the stage. A VIP experience is also available that includes reserved admission, plus access to a special VIP tent with free food and drinks for the entire weekend.

Another unique opportunity to take home a piece of history is a charity raffle being put on by the Great Bend Rocks Band Camp. Banshee donated one of their actual guitars used to record one of their famous albums, and all the bands will sign the guitar before it is raffled off on October 19th during Rock-N-Q on the Planes. Only 2,500 tickets will be sold for \$10 each and a winner will be drawn during the festival. Ticketholders do not have to be present to win.

Air Force Jazz Band to Perform in Great Bend



An Article by Barton Director of Innovation & Compliance Lee Miller was recently published in "Innovation Abstracts" magazine by the National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development (NISOD). NISOD is a membership organization committed to promoting and celebrating excellence in teaching, learning, and leadership at community and technical colleges.

Miller's article "The Skeletons In Our Closets: Creating New Bones for Open Educational Resources (OER) Development" focuses on the transition from traditional methods of educational content delivery to a focus on OER, which is a new philosophy focused on the idea that knowledge should be accessible to everyone and cost and availability should not be obstacles. It also focuses on more instructor input in not only content, but curriculum, class



design and engaging their students in as many ways as possible. "I wanted to address the big challenges that instructors were facing with moving to OER and to find a way to break it down and make it easier," she said. "How do we explain and encourage faculty to start the transition, and how do we make that transition as easy as possible."

Miller said the transition will take increased training and focus on instruction methods but will ultimately benefit the students and teachers. "I am very excited this was published," she said. "However, with this new initiative we still have a lot of work to do. I'm very thankful and appreciate all of the amazing instructors that have stepped forward to start tackling this challenge. We currently have more than 20 faculty who are working on moving their classes to the OER format both online and from different campuses."

Vice President of Instruction Elaine Simmons said it is important to her that Barton is always on the cutting edge of education and seeking paradigm shifts. "We couldn't be prouder of Lee and we are hopeful others will be published in the future," she said.


