## Celebrating Healthcare Unity in Great Bend

The University of Kansas Health System Celebrates Facility Dedication

In late September, The University of Kansas Health System hosted a special facilities dedication to commemorate the unification of Great Bend's healthcare providers, a process set in motion many months prior. In April of this year, it was announced that Great Bend Regional Hospital, along with its affiliated health clinics, were under contract to be purchased by the statewide healthcare leader. Then in early August, the official closing signaled a rebrand to The University of Kansas Health System Great Bend Campus.

Also part of The University of Kansas Health System are HaysMed, St. Rose Health Center, and Pawnee Valley Community Hospital, among others. "These facilities have historically competed for patients and market share," the system's leaders said in a press release after the closing. "Now they will be part of one system, with complementary services and providers, not competing but collaborating, focusing together on the needs of the community."

Providing the highest quality care to Kansans is the mission for The University of Kansas Healthcare System, according to Bob Page, President and CEO. "As healthcare across the country evolves, we are taking a new approach in Kansas. We pair the skill of our caregivers with evidence-based medicine and the most advanced technology. We offer this care with compassion, kindness and respect. Together, we can ensure people in Great Bend and across the state of Kansas have access to the right level of care, delivered in the most effective way."

The Great Bend Campus will remain a strong employer and healthcare provider as a result of this purchase. Great Bend's physicians, nurses, and staff were well received, and patients will continue to receive care from their current doctors and practitioners.

"How fortunate we are to have this joint venture with a company that has been consistently ranked in US News and World Report's Best Hospitals list. They were also listed in Ingram's Magazine as one of the best companies to work for in 2017," says Jan Peters, President/CEO for the Great Bend

Chamber of Commerce & Economic Development. "On behalf of our community, thank you for investing in Great Bend and for investing in high quality healthcare in rural Kansas. But most of all, thank you for investing in our people."

As part of the transition, St. Rose Health Center was also renamed The University of Kansas Health System St. Rose Medical Pavilion. All together, The University of Kansas Health System has over 910 licensed beds and serves more than 44,000 inpatients annually.

## **Apprentices Needed for Sunflower Diversified**

When Savannah Kennon wrapped up her apprenticeship recently at Sunflower Diversified Services, she considered looking for a job elsewhere. "Then, I thought, 'wait a minute. I cannot leave Sunflower," recalled Kennon, a recent Great Bend High School graduate. "I got so close to our clients who have developmental disabilities and delays. And Sunflower has been so good about offering flexible work hours."

Kennon, 18, spent her senior year as a paid apprentice in the non-profit agency's residential program. Today, she is a full-time residential staff member and taking 12 hours at Barton Community College (BCC).

Sunflower is now trying to recruit other high school seniors for apprenticeships. The non-profit agency could accept up to five students for these paid positions. "I would strongly encourage





seniors to consider doing this," said Kennon, a Great Bend native. "I have never looked at this as a job. It is great to build relationships with clients and staff members."

An apprentice is always shadowed by professional staff. Responsibilities vary depending on a client's level of independence. During her apprenticeship, Kennon worked at Sunflower's two group homes and now she also is supporting people in their own apartments. "I love being there for them, helping them," Kennon said. "We ensure clients have everything they need. Sometime it's help with cooking, feeding, personal hygiene and/or household chores.

"Other times, a client needs only a little support," she added. "Many clients are pretty independent and do a lot for themselves."

Kennon's goal is an associate's degree in criminal justice at BCC. She then plans to apply for a patrol officer position at the Great Bend Police Department. Ultimately, she wants to be a detective. "I know my Sunflower experiences will help me in law enforcement," she commented. "I have learned, and am still learning, many verbal and behavioral skills that help me relate well with people. Communication is so important."

Amanda Urban, Sunflower director of adult services, couldn't agree more. "Savannah wants to be a police officer and I believe she will excel, in part because of what she is learning here. "We are looking for other mature seniors in Sunflower's service area," Urban continued. "Yes, we want them to consider supporting people with disabilities as a career. However, the skills they learn would be invaluable in other types of human-services careers such as healthcare and social work."

Vicki Keffer, Sunflower director of human resources, encouraged anyone with questions to contact her by calling 620-792-1321. Sunflower can accept up to five apprentices, depending on the number of hours each can work. Keffer emphasized the agency will work around school hours and extra-curricular activities. Sunflower serves infants, toddlers and adults in Barton, Pawnee, Rice, Rush and Stafford counties. It is in its 52nd year.

# Supporting Health and Independence for Seniors

When the topics are Friendship Meals and Meals on Wheels, Brandi Gruber explains that the services are two sides of the same coin. Gruber is executive director of ElderCare Inc., which serves more than two dozen counties from its office in Great Bend. In addition to meals, it offers home services designed to allow people to stay at home for as long as possible.

## Friendship Meals

"ElderCare prepares and serves Friendship Meals five days a week at 39 senior centers in our 28-county area," Gruber said. "Those who cannot attend lunches at these centers count on Friendship Meals being delivered to their private homes. This is where all the great Meals on Wheels volunteers come in."

ElderCare, 5611 10th, provides 28,000 meals a month in its territory, which stretches from Great Bend south and west to the Oklahoma and Colorado borders. "Sometimes it can be overwhelming," Gruber acknowledged. "But between Tina

Mingenback and me, we travel to all 39 senior centers about every six weeks. As our dietary services manager, Tina ensures the meals we prepare are tasty and nutritious."

The time on the road pays dividends because cooks and other senior center workers want and deserve to talk with ElderCare administrators in person, Gruber noted. "Yes, we rely on phone calls and emails for a lot of day-to-day issues but we learn more when we meet face to face," Gruber said. "Our valued employees count on us and we will do anything we can to accommodate them."

Expenses incurred for Friendship Meals continue to climb but funding remains fairly stagnant. Some of the financial gaps are filled by businesses and individuals who sponsor meals in a variety of ways. "We are always looking for people to help with meal costs for a day, a week, a month," Gruber said. "This sponsorship program is crucial because it helps offset the costs. In addition, some local seniors want to socialize at lunch but they can't afford the small price of a meal. This leads to concerns about poor nutrition and isolation."

Those 60 and older can eat for \$3.50 per meal at a senior center, while those under 60 are asked to pay \$5.75. For more information about how to be a sponsor, contact Gruber or Mingenback by calling 620-792-5942.



## **Home Services**

Anyone looking for in-home caregiver employment is encouraged to contact ElderCare. Home Services personnel serve families in Barton, Pawnee, Rush, Stafford, Pratt, Kiowa, Edwards and Ford counties. "We recruit employees who have a genuine passion for working with the elderly," emphasized Gruber, a Great Bend native. "These valued employees visit elderly people in their homes to offer a wide variety of services."

"We collaborate with clients and their families, as well as their primaryhealthcare providers. Our medical services are varied and tailored to the

Some, but not all, ElderCare staff members have healthcare-related credentials. The non-profit entity relies on registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, certified nurse's aides and certified medication aides. "However," Gruber noted, "some clients need other kinds of services, including housekeeping, meal preparation, laundry and personal care; respite care for families also is available. These caregivers don't need a medical background but are a vital part of

New employees receive hands-on training by visiting clients side-by-side with a seasoned caregiver. Quarterly training sessions help employees enhance their skills and keep up with new practices. "All our caregivers learn at the outset they must be polite, professional and compassionate," Gruber said. "The services they offer, whether medical and/or personal, are extremely important to seniors. They deserve to maintain as much independence as possible for as long as possible.

"We also know that seniors' families want and deserve to be kept up-to-date," she continued. "They feel more at ease and have peace of mind that ElderCare is helping with daily activities for their loved ones."

While ElderCare is supported, in part, by tax dollars from the Southwest Kansas Area Agency on Aging, it also relies on private donations. "Since we are a member of United Way of Central Kansas, we encourage the community to support it," Gruber said. "We are always grateful for whatever United Way can do for seniors who need anything from a hot meal at lunch to an in-home professional caregiver. And anything

Home Services are available 24/7 and a physician referral is not necessary. ElderCare accepts Older American Act funds, private pay, long-term-care insurance and Medicaid. It also collaborates with the Veterans Administration. Of its 130 employees, about 70 serve clients in Barton County.

"All of us want to tend to medical and nutritional needs," Gruber summarized. "But equally important, we want to help lift our clients' spirits. Our visits let people know they are valued and we genuinely care about their physical and emotional well-being."

## Catholic Charities Awarded 3-Year Grant for Training

Catholic Charities of Southwest Kansas was recently awarded an Agency Capacity Initiative grant through Catholic Charities USA. This grant, which focuses on training, preparing, and resourcing five select Catholic Charities agencies, is geared towards providing support to allow agencies to more fully embrace, engage and implement resilience programming as part of the traditional work with and in local communities. This three-year grant was a competitive process, open to Catholic Charities agencies in a



ten state area. Catholic Charities of Southwest Kansas was selected because of the agency's deep commitment and desire to build and strengthen resiliency in southwest Kansas.

"2017 was an unprecedented year in terms of disasters and while no person or community is immune, the poor and vulnerable are more at risk to the impacts of a disaster and have a harder time recovering from a disaster," says Debbie Snapp, Executive Director for Catholic Charities of Southwest Kansas. "We will spend the next three years building the agency's capability to add strategic, resourceful thinking to each phase of the disaster cycle with an eye towards building resilient clients."

Over the course of the next three years, the agency will work to assess the vulnerabilities, potential hazards and resources in southwest Kansas and will seek to engage community partners in dialogues about disaster preparedness and community resiliency. "We are excited about this opportunity and look forward to providing opportunities for us to work together to strengthen those communities in which we live, work and serve," Snapp says.


